Author's Style

Style refers to the particular way that a piece of literature is written—not what is said, but how it is said. It is the writer's individual way of communicating ideas. The following elements contribute to a writer's style:

- Word choice, or diction, describes the writer's choice of language.
 Writers often choose vivid verbs, adjectives, and adverbs, and precise nouns. Diction often reveals the writer's tone.
- Tone is the attitude the writer takes toward his or her subject, such as humorous, serious, sarcastic, or joyful.
- Imagery is the use of words and phrases that appeal to the reader's senses.
- Sentence structure and variety refers to the lengths and kinds of sentences used.
